

The State of the Chi

Brothers,

As the Fall 2018 Semester comes to an end, I am thrilled with the achievements Theta Chapter has accomplished. I know we would not be in the position we are without the leaders that have come before us. While at Congress, Theta received several awards including Outstanding Community Service Award, Outstanding Participation with The Boys and Girls Club of America, and the Thomas A. Gehring Award for Chapter Excellence. This is the second year in a row that Theta chapter has been honored to receive The Gehring Award, and we would not have been able to do it without the amazing leadership in the house.

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Greek life at RPI this semester has been under extreme scrutiny. The Greek Life Task Force was created by Dr. Jackson in order to evaluate Greek life at Rensselaer. Theta has been an exemplary chapter for all Fraternities on campus and has been aiding in the revitalization of Greek life. I have been working hard with the Interfraternity Council in order for the IFC to have more power and allow our Greek community to hold ourselves more accountable. We held a special Presidents meeting at our Chapter House with all IFC Presidents, IFC Executive Board, and Panhel Executive Board in order to draft a proposal with concrete points on how we will strengthen our Community. The proposal was sent to the Task Force and was regarded as a wonderful addition to the proposal that will be sent to Dr. Jackson in this upcoming week.

Despite hard comings in recruitment for all Fraternities, thanks to the help of Br. Legatt, we were able to recruit 10 amazing New Members. That was a large hit in recruitment numbers across the board, but we were able to overcome the circumstances and have a great Fall class.

This past Spring semester we achieved a 4-Star distinction through the school Accreditation process. We improved our overall score from 873 to 893, and we were 7 points away from a 5-Star awarding. At the Greek awards for RPI, we were honored with receiving Excellence in Greek Relations, along with getting awarded runner up for 6 other categories.

The Theta Chapter is continuously improving and I am very excited to see what the next Executive Board will be able to accomplish. Despite the negative stigma surrounding Greek life, The Theta Chapter has, and will continue to not only be one of the best Chapters at RPI, but one of the best in all of America.

Fraternal Finances

Our bank account is healthy, bills are paid, and the budget is being followed. All is well for the house financially. The rush budget was adjusted to reflect the school's new rush schedule and sanctions on fraternities. With a shorter time to rush leading to fewer rush events, not as much money was needed to fill rush with quality events. With this cut, the extra cash was channeled into the epsilon, brotherhood, and gamma budgets. Epsilon was able to make some interior improvements and is planning more, brotherhood is planning more substantial events like a cabin trip and poker tournament, and gamma is buying/creating more high quality sorority gifts.

As Summer Arch approaches with the possibility of an increased number of brothers on campus in the summer, we are continuing our discussions about instituting summer dues as well as gradually increased semester dues to compensate for a reduced number of actives.

Unfortunately, we were not able to institute a fundraising campaign for the renovation of our foundation and sewage system. The late rush and sanctions on fraternity houses on campus conflicted with how we wanted to conduct the kick-off. It will be delayed until next fall, which also allows for further fleshing out of details and more time to increase awareness. In the meantime, all donations of any size are welcomed and appreciated, and they greatly improve day-to-day operations.

All in all, the house is doing very well and has a promising future.

Preventive Measures

The state of the house has improved immensely from last semester. This may not be evident from the semesterly Fire and Life Safety Report, on which we performed slightly worse. However, we believe this is exclusively due to the inspectors arbitrarily raising objections that were not brought to our attention last semester, and our central fire system inspection company being nearly impossible to contact. There is nothing anyone could have done about this and all we can do now is prepare for next semester's inspection with the knowledge we have now in order to make it a success.

In the weeks to come I will be working closely with the Epsilon, and our respective committees to resolve the issues that were pointed out. As a part of the semesterly risk management program the brothers and new members will receive a Bystander Intervention training during the week after Thanksgiving Break. By running this training for the house, we are ensuring that our chapter has the required percentage of members that are alcohol-risk management trained in order to host social events in the coming semesters. We have not had to deal with this problem in the present semester as the current sanctions against Greek Life prevent us from having any alcohol within the house whatsoever.

Lastly, I will be working with the new Eta-elect to make for a smooth transition process. I am confident in our future officers, and am optimistic about the state of risk management in the house. If we keep up the attitude we currently have, I believe we will bounce back from the current situation and emerge as a truly improved chapter.

Restoring the Chi

The last few months have seen the houses change dramatically. Over the summer, Br. Rosengrant and his family generously refinished the floors of the Main house. The ground floor, the staircase, and hallways all look brand new now. The Fall workweek was very successful, and saw the fence around the house and the window trims getting a fresh coat of paint, the interior paint got touched up in spots, and the storage shed in the backyard has been painted and shelving installed. The attic of the Annex has been gradually getting cleared out to make room for future improvements. As a part of that, we hosted a neighborhood yard sale with the Alpha Gamma Delta sorority which helped some of the more forgotten items in the attic see new life.

We now have a permanent trash solution as well, which is a welcome update from last newsletter. We are partnered with Republic Services to provide weekly dumpster services for the next three years. So far, they have been much easier to work with than the City of Troy. Unfortunately, at the end of the summer a pipe burst in the boiler room damaging the water tank. It has since been replaced however, and the main house water temperature has yet to be an issue.

As I end my term as Epsilon, I am starting to implement a 4-stage process to modernize and update the interiors of both houses. The first stage includes repainting and redoing the trim around the hallways. This includes adding a chair rail, updating the molding, and updating the color scheme. The second stage involves remodelling the bathrooms. As the semesters progress, the bathrooms have been getting neglected and are in dire need of a modernization. The third stage of my plan involves redoing the common areas. This includes the ground floor and basement of the main. We will be updating the trim and paint of all areas. The fourth and final stage will be to incrementally upgrade individual rooms of the houses. I see this being the most difficult and time consuming stage.

Furthermore, I will be updating the officer transition binder to allow the next Epsilon, Br. Marc McDonald '20, to be more effective as he transitions into taking on the responsibilities of Epsilon. This will include detailed instructions on common tasks, locations of important information, and resources to help with unforeseen events.

I look forward to working with Br. McDonald to make the transition as smooth as possible, and look forward to seeing the state of the Chapter house continuously improve.

The members of Sheer Idiocy will be emceeing the event. The second event in the works is a Dessert Delivery Service with the Hong Kong Student Association. The desserts will be made by the HKSA and delivered by the brothers. The last big thing that we are planning is to build a dog park in Beman Park on 15th St. This is a great way to connect with the community and help brothers get philanthropy hours.

Focusing on Academics

This semester, we worked to implement a new academic program for the chapter, primarily focusing on assigning personalized academic plans for each brother to create a more academically focused house for current and future members to follow. These plans will require brothers to attend study hours that are held at the house or in class-rooms reserved with the registrar in order to get away from any distractions and focus on succeeding in brothers' academic endeavors. Study hours are now held more frequently so Brothers with demanding and differing schedules have more opportunities to come.

Ways to encourage aiding one another in academics are through review sessions held by older brothers who can go over material for the house's more populated courses and answer questions, as well as one-on-one tutoring, which both award brothers based on the point system. Brothers are strongly encouraged to attend ALAC Drop-In Tutoring and Success Labs which give helpful advice regarding motivation, organization and finals preparation.

In addition to providing these academic resources, there is still an emphasis on rewarding academic improvement and excellence. We have been steadily increasing the house GPA and our goal will be to


increase our academic performance above the All Men's Average. Providing tools to encourage academic success, we hope to create a long standing tradition as one of the most academically prominent houses on campus.
